		George Lane	George Lane died 1873. Joseph Lane #2 aka Om pahgahkahni or Good Elk) was the son of George Lane. He was born in 1865. Joseph Lane #2 told the Quapaw Tribe when asked to live on Quapaw Reservation in 1885, that he was no longer with the Quapaws. He was with the Osages and that he wanted no land at Quapaw and did not want to be a Chief. He had never served as Chief.

Census Rolls	1889	Louis Angel	Most of Quapaw tribe back to Quapaw Reservation that wanted to go back. Several Quapaw families stayed with the Osages.
Documents	1890	John Medicine Pete Clabber	Started appointing Acting Chiefs (English speaking) to work with the Government. All Quapaws back in Quapaw except those that chose to stay with Osages: Lombards, Lanes, Baltimores, Youngs, Browns, Aikens, Nixes, Cedars, Downings, etc.
